Three federal courts have blocked the changes to Public Charge determination

The changes to the Public Charge determination were set to go into effect on October 15, 2019, however three separate federal courts have blocked this process.

Judge Daniels, in his order, faulted the government for not adequately explaining why it was changing the definition of a "public charge" or why the change was needed. "The Rule is simply a new agency policy of exclusion in search of a justification."

As a reminder, the determination on whether or not someone will become a "public charge" is an administered test, used in the immigration process. Here's a quick summary of the change, now temporarily blocked.

Under the new regulation, caseworkers would consider enrollment in the widely used **Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)**, certain federally funded Medicaid benefits and a variety of forms of government-subsidized housing, including the popular Section 8 vouchers. Officials would deem an immigrant a "public charge" and deny the application if they determine he or she is more likely than not to use one of the considered benefits for 12 months or longer over the span of three years.

City of Dallas launches challenge to address food insecurity

The City of Dallas Office of Innovation, in partnership with the Communities Foundation of Texas, is seeking creative ideas to increase access to local, nutritious and affordable food options for all Dallas residents. The Food Idea Innovation Challenge, which launches this week, will allow Dallas residents the opportunity to submit ideas and solutions on how the city can work towards solving food inequities in their communities.

<u>Ideas can be submitted online through a crowdsourcing idea management tool.</u>

Written submission forms will also be available at Dallas Women, Infant and Children (WIC) Centers, libraries and recreation centers throughout the city. Once ideas have been submitted, residents are encouraged to vote on their favorite idea. Proposals will then be reviewed by city staff and stakeholders. Selected ideas will then be piloted by the city. Ultimately, the Food Idea Innovation Challenge will aid the city's efforts in having better food access, healthier food choices, more locally grown food and reduce food waste.

"Rather than producing a solution from City Hall initially, we are first seeking ideas from our constituents," said Laila Alequresh, Chief Innovation Officer for the City of Dallas. "We look forward to co-creating solutions with our residents that cater to the challenges facing our communities. We are proud to partner with the Communities Foundation of Texas on this initiative."

In Dallas, 36% of residents live in a federally defined food desert and it is estimated that 1 in 5 children live in food insecure households according to the North Texas Food Bank.

The deadline to submit ideas is Thursday, November 21, 2019. The review process and piloting of selected submissions will begin Spring of 2020.
